Leaving a Legacy to Flint House

Making a gift in your Will to a charity such as The Police Rehabilitation Centre, Flint House is really simple. This section provides you with everything you need to know about how to leave us a legacy.

There are a number of ways you can leave a legacy. The following information sets out the three major alternatives and suggests suitable wordings.

You should seek the advice of a solicitor on how to prepare or alter your Will and naturally your first consideration will be to protect the interests of your family, relatives and friends. You should always be sure that you have thought carefully about the implications of leaving additional legacies and that you have taken proper legal and tax advice so that you are fully informed of the consequences of doing so.

If you do choose to leave a legacy, you can do so from the following options:

“Officer injured, urgent assistance required.”

Pecuniary Legacy



A Pecuniary Legacy is one that specifies an amount of money. It is simple and straightforward to action, but makes no allowance for inflation. A gift of £250 today may well be worth a lot less in 20 or 30 years time, so specifying a percentage of your estate maybe preferable.

A suggested suitable wording for a Pecuniary Legacy is:

“I GIVE the sum of £..... (- in words - pounds) free of tax to The Police Rehabilitation Centre, Flint House (Registered Charity No. 1146913) of Reading Road, Goring-on-Thames,

Oxfordshire, RG8 0LL, for its general purposes and I DECLARE that receipt from the Treasurer or other proper officer for the time being of the Charity shall be a good discharge for the gift.”

If before my death (or after my death but before my Executors have given effect to this gift) the Charity has changed its name or amalgamated with or transferred all of its assets to another body then my Executors shall give effect to the gift as if it had been a gift (in the first case) to the Charity in its changed name or (in the second case) to the body which results from the amalgamation or to the body to which the assets have been transferred.



Specific Legacy

A Specific Legacy enables you to leave something of value which can be used by the charity in any manner we think fit.

A suggested suitable wording for a Specific Legacy is:

“I give my..... free of tax to The Police Rehabilitation Centre, Flint House (Registered Charity No. 1146913) of Reading Road, Goring-on-Thames, Oxfordshire, RG8 0LL, for its general

purposes and I DECLARE that receipt from the Treasurer or other proper officer for the time being of the Charity shall be a good discharge for the gift.”

If before my death (or after my death but before my Executors have given effect to this gift) the Charity has changed its name or amalgamated with or transferred all of its assets to another body then my Executors shall give effect to the gift as if it had been a gift (in the first case) to the Charity in its changed name or (in the second case) to the body which results from the amalgamation or to the body to which the assets have been transferred.

Residuary Legacy



A Residuary Legacy is when you leave the balance of your estate after everything else is taken care of.

A suggested suitable wording for a Residuary Legacy is:

“Subject to the payment of my debts, funeral and testamentary expenses, legacies and all tax payable from my estate I GIVE the residue of my estate (including any property over which I may have a

general power of appointment or disposition by ill) to The Police Rehabilitation Centre, Flint House (Registered Charity No. 1146913) of Reading Road, Goring-on-Thames, Oxfordshire, RG8 0LL, for its general purposes and I DECLARE that receipt from the Treasurer or other proper officer or the time being of the Charity shall be a good discharge for the gift.”

If before my death (or after my death but before my Executors have given effect to this gift) the Charity has changed its name or amalgamated with or transferred all of its assets to another body then my Executors shall give effect to the gift as if it had been a gift (in the first case) to the Charity in its changed name or (in the second case) to the body which results from the amalgamation or to the body to which the assets have been transferred.
